## Arnold Seniors Selected to Attend Academies

It will be a short summer vacation and the beginning of a long career for six senior students of the General H. H. Arnold High School here in Wiesbaden.

With graduation just around the corner, the six seniors will further their education by attending the military academies, Stanford University and the University of Florida, it was announced this week by Mr. Paul G. Taylor, principal of the high school.

Three of the seniors, John S. Cobb, William P. George and William W. Holoday will report to the Air Force Academy at Denver, Colo., June 23. The other military academy selectee, Danny P. Barrett will be attending West Point.

The other two seniors, George R. Robison will attend the University of Florida, reporting in September and Robert Millberry will attend Stanford University.

John, the son of Mr. and Mrs. George P. Cobb, DAFC, HQ, GEMA, received word of his Congressional appointment in April by way of Congressman Leonard Van Dierlin, of the 27th Congressional District in California. The Cobb's have another son, George N., who is a third-classman at the Air Force Academy, and he also was appointed by Congressman Van Dierlin.

Young Cobb is undecided on his major but hopes to take the necessary training to become a pilot.

William, whose parents, Lt. Col. (Ret.) and Mrs. Richard P. George, formerly assigned to Hqs. 22 Weather Wing, rotated to the U.S. in October for retirement, also received word of his selection in April. His selection, Congressional and Presidential, was by Congressman Seymour Halpern, Long Island, N. Y.

William expects to major in

astronautical engineering and also take pilot training.

Holoday, son of Lt. Col. and Mrs. William J. Holoday, HQ USAF, DSC/Personnel, received his Congressional appointment from Senator Everett B. Jordan of North Carolina.

William, like young Cobb and George, is hopeful of becoming a pilot and is undecided on what he will pursue for his major.

The lone West Pointer, Danny, son of Maj. and Mrs. Ernest F. Barrett, HQ, 8th Aviation Battalion, (Army) Mainz, tested at Heidelberg in March. Danny also received a Congressional appointment by Senator Pat McNamara, Flint, Mich. The potential cadet will take his physical June 8 at West Point and if successful will enter the academy in July.

As the winner of a National

Merit Scholarship, George R. Robison, will attend the University of Florida. George, the only USAF sponsored merit scholar named this year, won the honor in competition with other semi-finalists in the United States who scored in the top one-half of one per cent of the senior population on the National Merit Scholarship test and college entrance board examination.

The final phase of competition included the high school grades, creative accomplishments, leadership qualities, extra curricular activities and school citizenship.

George is the son of Lt. Col. and Mrs. Ivy H. Robison, MAAG in Bonn.

Receiving word of his selection in the Regular NROTC Student Program was Robert Millberry, son of Col. and Mrs. Robert L. Millberry, HQ USAF, C.E.

Robert will attend Stanford University under the naval program which includes full tuition, books and fees. Upon graduation he will enter the Navy as an ensign or the Marine Corps as a second lieutenant.

## 14 High School Students Win Scholarships

# Warriors Blank Royals, Chieftains Down Bad Kreuznach in Teenage Openers

The Wiesbaden Warriors, last years Germany champions, started off on the right foot as they downed the Rhein Main Royals in their season opener 7-0, and then won the seven inning night-cap 4-0.

Jim Maloney hurled a one hit affair in the first game of the double header while the Warriors banged out eleven hits off the Rhein Main hurler, Joe Sun-tag. Sid Vest matched Maloney's shutout in the second game with a neat two-hitter.

The Warriors broke the first game open in the third inning on back to back doubles by Bill Rivers and Chuck Sharpe, a single by Ron Burge, a Royal error, and Maloney's sacrifice fly. Vest and Burgess paced the attack with two hits apiece, one of Vest's being a two-run homer in the seventh frame. Singles by Vest, Stu Silverman, and Sid Spain, followed by a two base error accounted for the other runs.

Meanwhile Maloney was breezing along on a one-hitter, fanning 12 and walking only one. He was in trouble only in the fifth where Rhein Main picked up their lone hit on a bad hop single over River's head.

The Warriors could manage to get only five hits in the nightcap, but three unearned runs were all Vest needed in spinning his two-hit victory. He struck out eight Royal batsman and walked none en route to the victory.

The Warriors are idle in league play this weekend but travel to Karlsruhe next weekend. On the docket for this weekend, however, is a practice game with a Canadian teenage team. The game will be played Sunday at Lindsey AS and will start at 2 p.m.

## Chieftain's Contests

The Wiesbaden Chieftains baseball team opened their season last Sunday with two big wins over Bad Kreuznach. The visiting Chieftains chalked up 27 runs on 33 hits in the double header.

In the first game Craig Mathias, team captain, shocked the Bad Kreuznach nine by blasting the first pitch of the game into deep center for a triple and then scoring on a bad throw from the outfield.

Bad Kreuznach retaliated in their half of the inning by crossing the plate twice, but the Chieftains came right back in the second to even up the score.

In the third inning the Chieftains scored nine runs on nine hits to sew up the game. They later tallied two in the fourth and three in the ninth to give them an easy 18-3 victory.

In the seven-inning second game, Wiesbaden had it a little rougher. Bad Kreuznach led 2-0

going into the third when the Chieftains exploded for six runs. The Wiesbaden nine scored once more in the fourth, fifth and seventh innings to win 9-6.

Vernon Arnold, Wiesbaden's ace starter; received credit for the first win allowing seven hits. He fanned eight and gave up only one walk. Bruce Divine recorded the win in the second game, but needed help from reliever Sam Bale in the seventh.

Nearly everyone carried big sticks in Wiesbaden's torrid 33 hit attack. Jim Williams was good for three extra base hits, going four for seven for the day. Bale collected five hits, including two doubles, while Mathias, Divine, Arnold and Rick Kepner each added four singles.

Kepner, Rick Biscayart, and Bale turned two would-be hits into double plays to add a touch of professionalism to the second game.

The Chieftain's games this weekend have been postponed until a later date.
